On the Christian Journey... with Pastor Christopher

It has been quite a week. I'm still learning about connections that I have to those who perished in the flight from Wichita to DC. A classmate of my son's, several friends of friends. One couple from my home church had spent the last couple of weeks assisting with the ice-skating events held in Wichita and thus had gotten to know many of the skaters, families and coaches. Many who had been celebrating and thriving suddenly gone. As Christians, we know that suffering and death do not have the final word, yet events like this shake us. It seems sudden and senseless. A shift from the way things are supposed to be. I've also been involved, either directly in counseling and advocacy, or on the fringes of, several other

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conversations this week – about bearing witness and being brave. I know a number of people who are seeing their rights, their ability to make choices about themselves and their future stripped, controlled, and criminalized. People being scapegoated and victimized for being different or lacking some paperwork. These tragedies are not a sudden plane crash. They unfold slowly and deliberately, yet they can be just as

devastating to families and communities and I believe lead us away from Christ. It has been a heavy couple of weeks...

and I am called to speak and speak out – and to do so in a way that heals and helps rather than divides and diminishes. It is hard work. I often fall short. Yet this is the task of pastoral and prophetic ministry. Of discipleship.

Through all of this, I've been reading Luke 4. As I said in worship last week, Luke 4 – the story of Jesus visit to his hometown synagogue is the assigned lectionary gospel reading, and while I often don't follow the lectionary, it is amazing to me how often this set of readings, chosen to share the story of Jesus and the story of the Church over a 3 year period through the annual liturgical cycle of Advent, Christmas, Epiphany, Lent, Easter, Pentecost, and 'ordinary times" winds up speaking precisely to the current moment. Imagine a sermon proclaiming hope and urging mercy and connection


enraging an audience... these are the times we live in – and these stories of Scripture written two and three thousand years ago illustrate, inform, comfort, and challenge. As I am walking through these times, I was struck by the image of Jesus walking through the crowd. I don't think it's a miracle where he just "disappears." I think it's a process.

I envision people in the crowd who realize their anger is misplaced, that their actions are harmful. People who experience repentance and are not following the mob. They are confused but they realize throwing Jesus off the cliff is wrong... (*Continued on next page*).

that those stories about the foreigners - Naaman and the widow – are to teach. That maybe this man who read from Isaiah of reconciliation and hope is the way that happens. That their call is to join Jesus in making a way... Through these stories we learn how to let the Spirit fill our plans with purpose and our wounds with healing. Through February we will continue the Six Stone Jars series then in Lent we will do something a little different.



Lent is about repentance and often we tend towards a heavy feeling. This year, sparked in large part by an the insight about people in the Luke 4 crowd above, we will instead look at ourselves as "Purveyors of Awe." What if, instead of "fighting" for what we believe we sought to bring peace about it? It strikes me that this is what Jesus does – he does not capitulate or give in, but he also rarely escalates. He creates space for others to recognize and respond. We do need to repent – and some of that is from our own patterns of control and scapegoating. Marcia McFee writes: "I have come to believe that one of the most important things that

spiritual leaders and communities can do is promote the idea and experience of awe to the wider community—to those who will never walk through the doors of the church. We can make the world a better place, not only by inviting people into the church community, not only by programs that alleviate suffering (and all that is right and good), but also by inviting people to be simply and deeply well. Awe and its elements have a role in that wellbeing and spiritual leaders can create events and opportunities for the greater community to experience this." We will journey through lent seeking to become deeply devoted disciples of Christ who point others to the wonder of our creator, redeemer, and sustainer.





PASTOR TRAVEL



February 4-7 Pastor Christopher will be in Denver for the 2nd in-person cohort of his Center for Pastoral Effectiveness track. One of the requirements for clergy in the Great Plains Conference is continuing education. This life-long learning is twofold: spiritual formation and professional development. **Spiritual formation** is the intentional pursuit of the nourishment and renewal of one's relationship with Jesus Christ through the power of the Holy Spirit and the use of spiritual disciplines. **Professional development** is the intentional growth of professional identity, and the skills utilized in ministry that will enhance the effectiveness and excellence of the clergyperson. Beginning last year, I am currently addressing both of these aspects through participation in Track 1 of the *Center*

for Pastoral Effectiveness of the Rockies with an ecumenical group of fellow clergy. This is a series of 6 inperson retreats and various other check-ins that will incorporate elements of both Spiritual Formation and Professional Development over 140 contact hours. With an ecumenical group of clergy, I am doing some deep work on understanding "family systems" and ways to overcome stubborn emotional barriers and facilitate change, focusing primarily on ourselves as the only person we can really change. This is not vacation time but a deliberate attempt to improve as a person and a pastor.

Then in March, Pastor Christopher and Robin will take some real vacation time. Departing March 1st and leading up to their anniversary on March 7th, they will travel to Florida to see both their boys coach, including a game against each other when Dordt, where Ian is now Head Coach plays Southeastern University (Lakeland, FL) where Aaron is now a graduate assistant. After they get back Pastor will take a few more days and attend a "**Roots for Your Soul**" clergy retreat offered by the Great Plains Conference for a time of rest and reflection. He will be back in the office March 13.

A pastoral care contact has not yet been determined but will be announced as the dates get closer.

WORSHIP WHILE PASTOR TRAVELS



On Sunday, March 2nd is Transfiguration Sunday. The season of Epiphany comes to an end as we approach Lent. Our guest preacher will be a seminary classmate of Pastor Christopher's. Rev. Emily Stirewalt is works with the SilverLink program at Church of the Resurrection in Leawood providing pastoral care to residents of care homes and assisted living situations and she will share on the story of the Transfiguration and what it means to her.

On Wednesday, March 5th, we will hold an Ash Wednesday service here at First UMC. While Pastor will be out of state, laity from our congregation will share readings, scripture, music, and the imposition of ashes to begin our Lenten journey. Often Lent, and Ash Wednesday in particular, is seen as a heavy time. As we begin the sermon series "Purveyors of Awe" this service will help us name and encounter the beauty of our finite lives and Christ's presence. Repentance is not about beating ourselves up, but embracing the wholeness and beauty God offers in times of both light, and darkness; mountaintops and valleys. Mark your calendar!





Then on Sunday, March 9th, our Southeast Kansas District Lay Leader Nancy Richwine will be here to share the message. This is the first Sunday in Lent but it is not yet determined if Nancy will share part of the Lenten series or share a message of her own – either way she has an abundance of faith, hope, joy, and life experiences to share and Pastor has enjoyed getting to know Nancy as they both serve on the District Committee on Ministry.



2020 marked two major milestones for baseball: the Negro Leagues celebrated their 100th anniversary and Major League Baseball merged statistics of these African American players with those of the major league. The history of Negro League baseball in America mirrors the racial strife experienced by African Americans in society. It was plagued by discrimination, racism, and inequity, while its athletes were celebrated for their resiliency, professionalism, and athleticism. The Kansas City Monarchs barnstormed across Kansas and the region to play more than 400 games between 1920 and 1957 against local towns. This talk sheds new light on this sports history and the history of baseball in Kansas.

Phil S. Dixon a co-founder of the Negro Leagues Baseball Museum in Kansas City. He is the author of nine books about baseball, including biographies about Wilber "Bullet" Rogan and John "Buck" O'Neil. In the course of his research, he has interviewed over 500 former Negro League players and family members.

"The Kansas City Monarchs and America's National Pastime" is part of Humanities Kansas's Speakers
Bureau, featuring humanities-based presentations designed to share stories that inspire, spark
conversations that inform, and generate insights that strengthen civic engagement.

Pastor Christopher is sharing this Open Letter from Faith and Order, a part of the Council of Bishops of the United Methodist Church

Dear Bishop Budde,

Grace and peace to you from God and our Lord Jesus Christ.

The Committee on Faith and Order of The United Methodist Church is a resource for our denomination that provides "a venue and context for ongoing conversation on matters of faith, doctrine, order and discipline" (Book of Discipline of The United Methodist Church, ¶445.1). We gathered this weekend to engage in our work and in some of our discussion reflected on the theological conversation happening in the United States at this time, including your sermon at the National Cathedral on January 21.

Your sermon sought to ground national unity in honoring the inherent dignity of all, in honest conversation and in humility. Because you ended your sermon asking the newly elected U.S. President to have mercy on frightened and vulnerable persons, you have been the recipient of vitriol and threats to your well-being. A resolution has even been introduced in the House of Representatives condemning your sermon. At the same time, many voices have risen to support you and we join those voices.


In The United Methodist Church we encourage our bishops to live out "a prophetic commitment for the transformation of the Church and the world." We say, "the role of the bishop is to be a prophetic voice for justice in a suffering and conflicted world" (The Book of Discipline ¶403.1.d). We believe this is in keeping with the prophetic tradition of Amos who encouraged us to "let justice roll down like waters and righteousness like an everflowing stream" and Micah who told us that what the Lord requires is justice, kindness and humility before God. We believe this is in keeping with the ministry of Jesus who took special care for the least. We witnessed such episcopal leadership in you this week. You inspired and encouraged us. As a committee we found your sermon profoundly rooted in the prophetic tradition of our shared Christian faith, while being delivered with gentleness and respect. We are pleased to call you a friend in Christ and offer our prayers.
