#### On the Christian Journey... with Pastor Christopher

Oh, how special the music, real candlelight, and 132 friends and family gathered for Christmas Eve were! My thanks to everyone who helped make our Advent and Christmas Eve services so special! I hope you are remembering to take deep breaths and center yourself in this season of Christmas:

Once for the one who Created you... once for the Incarnate One who walks beside you... and once for the Spirit whose life fills your being.

And Christmas is a season! Christmas *began* on Dec. 25<sup>th</sup> and lasts until Epiphany on January 6<sup>th</sup> (the 12 days!). In fact, at one time, the season officially extended 40 days until

Candlemas! The church has had different traditions and understandings over the years. I find it best to hold what we believe gently and loosely – holding space for other views but diving deeply into what helps us



exemplify Christ in our time and place. It's not about enforcing right answers or practices but sharing lived experience that is increasingly Christlike. To help us continue to work (and play) towards that, we will start 2024 with two more special worship services. On Sunday, January 7<sup>th</sup> we will celebrate Epiphany – the festival marking the Magi's arrival as told in Matthew's Gospel. You are encouraged, and supplies will be available, to enact the ancient ritual of "Chalking the Door" at your home. We'll revisit that on both Dec. 31<sup>st</sup> and Jan. 7<sup>th</sup> services and there is more

information in this newsletter. After that January 7<sup>th</sup> Epiphany service, we'll take the decorations down and return to "ordinary" time – while continuing to carry the light of Christ with us!

But ordinary time does not mean the end of special worship services! During the service on January 14<sup>th</sup>, we will celebrate the Baptism of Christ with a ceremony I call "3 Basins." We will each be invited to move between 3 stations – one is Pilate's basin, where we remember Pilate's attempt to wash his hands of responsibility for Jesus' crucifixion and will reflect on our own choices and rationalizations. Next, we will visit the Remembrance basin – remembering (or anticipating) our Baptism and the gift of God's grace that surrounds and equips us, waiting for us to respond! Finally, we will visit the Servant's basin – when we respond to the gift of grace, we grow in love and express that love in ministry. How are you called to ministry in 2024?



One step might be to formally become a member of First United Methodist Church – we have one person planning to join that day and I'd be delighted to add your name. Talk with me about where you are at in your spiritual journey! Another might be to join (or start!) a small group around a particular interest or a Sunday School class. Or you might rededicate yourself to prayer or a volunteer project. Whatever next step is yours, thanks for being a part of the community at First United Methodist!

## Chalking the Doors – an Epiphany Tradition

In Deuteronomy 6:9 God tells the people of Israel: "These words that I command you today shall be on your heart. You shall teach them diligently to your children, and shall talk of them when you sit in your house... You shall write them on the doorposts of your house and on your gates."

Chalking the door is a tangible way to honor God in our lives and be intentional about living into God's blessings in the new year. The first and last numbers simply refer to the year – so we'll use 20 and 24. The letters C M B come from the traditional names

for the Magi: Caspar, Melchior, and Balthazar. Alternately, they can stand for "Christus Mansionem Benedicat" which in Latin means, "May Christ bless this dwelling!"

Join us on December 31<sup>st</sup> and January 7th for a suggested liturgy to use, then add it to your doors!

rarely be canceled for snow, unless Pastor just cannot make it safely from the parsonage (in which case few others would try anyway). Ice, rather than snow, would likely drive a Sunday cancellation decision. If a cancellation is made, notice will be posted to Facebook and emailed to our MailChimp Updates list. (*Sundays and any cancellations that do NOT match USD 234 will also be called into KOMB 103.5 Radio*).

A First UMC SOAPBOX DERBY ENTRY?


Seth Needham and BSA Troop 114 are working to bring a new event to Good Old Days!

#### 2024 UMC CONNECTIONAL SPECIAL OFFERINGS for First UMC Fort Scott

The Special Sundays of The United Methodist Church, celebrated annually, illustrate the nature and calling of the Church. These special Sundays approved by General Conference are the only Sundays of churchwide emphasis. Funds are collected by local congregations and sent on to our Annual Conference for distribution to conference and denominational entities. Note the Special Offering on the Memo Line. Dates are set by General Conference but can be adjusted by local congregations should conflicts arise. In 2024, Pastor Christopher plans to adjust one of the dates to avoid conflicting themes and give each of these special offerings the attention and focus they deserve. You are invited to learn about each of the six and see where you might be called to share your generosity with the larger church for the transformation of the world.



#### Human Relations Day – January 14, 2024

Human Relations Day is the Sunday before the Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. national holiday and supports outreach to underserved communities, ministries that respond to non-violent youth offenders, community advocacy, and faith-based volunteer programs for community developers, and other programs that work with at-risk teens. It also supports at-risk youth through the Youth Offender Rehabilitation Program administered by the General Board of Church and Society. The offering also supports community developers and community advocacy through the United Methodist Voluntary Service administered through the General Board of Global Ministries. One hundred percent of the offering goes to the General Council on Finance and Administration.

#### UMCOR Sunday – March 10, 2024

UMCOR (United Methodist Committee on Relief) is the fourth Sunday of Lent. This offering supports disaster and emergency relief administered by the United Methodist Committee on Relief. It enables emergency grants and supplies immediately after a disaster, provides for sustainable sources of food, water, and shelter, and allows UMCOR workers and volunteers to be among the earliest to arrive and the last to leave when people are in need. This offering helps strengthen communities through both disaster preparedness and long-term recovery. The special Sunday offering underwrites UMCOR's costs of doing business, allowing UMCOR to keep the promise that 100% of any gift to a specific UMCOR project will go toward that project (through Advances), rather than administrative costs. The offering is also used to create grants for partners around the world under UMCOR's different programmatic areas.





#### Native American Ministries Sunday – April 14th, 2024

This offering supports the development and strengthening of Native American ministries in the annual conferences, Native American rural, urban, reservation ministries, and communities relating to the General Board of Global Ministries. This offering provides scholarships for Native Americans attending United Methodist schools of theology and it is distributed by the General Board of Higher Education and Ministries and The General Board of Global Ministries with 50% remaining in the annual conference for the Committee on Native American Ministries (CONAM) to administer.

#### United Methodist Student Day – We will pick a date in August as School Starts

The United Methodist Student Day offering provides for over 70 scholarships available for United Methodist students to further their education and enrich the life of the Church. The Gift of Hope Scholarship is administered by the General Board of Higher Education and Ministry. One hundred percent of the offering received goes to this scholarship fund.

#### Peace with Justice Sunday – May 26th, 2024

Peace with Justice Sunday is the first Sunday after Pentecost. The General Board of Church and Society has a vision to promote justice, by advocating public policies that protect the rights of all people. This offering supports the fostering of a better world by educating leaders and change-makers to become grassroots activists and global advocates who challenge systems of inequality. It also supports the connection of networks with ecumenical communities to advance peace and justice. Fifty percent provides grants to local churches, districts, conferences, and other affiliated organizations that advocate for peace with justice while the other 50% remains in your annual conference to develop local peace with justice ministries and support a peace with justice coordinator.

#### World Communion Sunday – October 6th, 2024

The offering supports a diverse mix of national and international ethnic young adults to make a global impact for Christ. The offering supports the Ethnic Scholarship Program and the Ethnic In-Service Training Program through the General Board of Higher Education and Ministry which provides ethnic scholarships for graduate students from the U.S. and other countries. It also supports the World Communion Scholarship Leadership Development Program administered by the General Board of Global Ministries. This offering provides ethnic scholarships for U.S. and international undergraduate students studying in the U.S. and funds In-Service Training Programs for racial and ethnic persons.





#### Liturgists Needed!

An important part of each Sunday is the participation of liturgists in helping lead worship. Normally the liturgist leads the Call to Worship and reads two scriptures. Liturgist are given a full script of their parts a few days in advance. This practice helps honor the ministry of the laity and bring different voices to the liturgy. In recent months health concerns and other conflicts have limited the participation of many of our regulars. Pastor would very much appreciate some new folks helping out. #### **UPCOMING COMMITTEE MEETINGS -** in Library unless noted.

Administrative Board sets policy for the church usually meets the 3rd Wednesday at 7pm about every other month. All church members are welcome to attend. The January meeting has been delayed until Wednesday, January 24<sup>th</sup> to allow more time for end of year financial and statistical reports to be generated accurately. Still 7pm in the Library. Future meeting dates will be confirmed at that gathering.

**Finance** reviews the budget and transactions and advises Admin Board on financial matters. Carol Majors is Chairperson. Finance will meet on the 3<sup>rd</sup> Wednesday at 7pm in months when Administrative Board does not meet – so their first 2024 meetings will be Wednesday, February 21<sup>st</sup> and April 17<sup>th</sup>.

**Trustees** oversees maintenance of the building and grounds. Robert Wilson is current chair, but this committee elects their own chair in January. They will now meet on the 2<sup>nd</sup> Thursday of every other month at 4:30pm with Thursday, January 11<sup>th</sup> as the first 2024 meeting. Unless projects that need to be discussed come up, they will likely skip the March 14<sup>th</sup> meeting date and gather again May 9<sup>th</sup>.

**Memorials** oversees gifts left to the church from our great cloud of witnesses. This group will meet in the Parlor at 3pm on the 3<sup>rd</sup> Tuesday – so January 16<sup>th</sup> and March 19<sup>th</sup> are their first meetings of 2024. Pastor Christopher chairs this committee with Linda Hessong as Treasurer. (corrected from first printing)

**HOCROC** – Hospitality, Outreach, and Community Relations Committee. This group plans and or oversees special events, fellowship opportunities and initiated our Healthy Congregations grants. They meet as needed with January 15<sup>th</sup>, March 18<sup>th</sup> and May 20<sup>th</sup> currently on the calendar.

**SPRC** – Staff Parish Relations is only required to meet 4 times a year unless there are particular needs or issues. 5 They will gather in late March or April with a May 15<sup>th</sup> deadline for this year's pastoral evaluation.
