Today I begin year 3 of my appointment to Fort Scott! As I reflect on the past two years, I am grateful. I have not, by a long shot, been the perfect Pastor. There are decisions, statements, and missed opportunties that I regret – but overall I think our time together so far has been very fruitful. Together we are discerning and responding to where God is calling and leading us!

This year's VBS theme was "Ready, Set, MOVE! Follow Jesus here, there and everywhere!" I have been reflecting on that as I enjoyed a remarkably uplifting Annual Conference, then a wonderful, if sometimes difficult, ASP mission trip, and then time with friends and away with Robin on vacation. These experiences



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helped me deepen and renew connections, as well as step outside of my comfort zone and use my gifts and creativity in different ways. The first half of our vacation was a watercolor painting retreat with friends from Pretty Prairie. I'm definitely not a skilled painter, but my brushwork and technique are improving and I've been motivated to return to my dabbling with iconography again soon. "Writing" icons is a prayer practice from the Eastern Orthodox tradition which uses egg tempera and pigment rather than watercolor, but shares many brush techniques. Prior to this year's vacation, the last time I was in New Mexico was for a workshop where I began learning about iconography, but I haven't done any of that since moving here. I think it is time to reconnect with the practice!

One of the last things we did on vacation was visit one of my favorite places on earth – Puye Mesa. Sacred ancestral land of the Santa Clara Pueblo people, yet

abaondoned since 1600 - I have had the priviledge to walk here 3 times now. Each trip has been unique and given me deeper insight into their journey as well as my own. I have reflected on how important it is to remember and honor the past without being confined by it. To be willing to change, even radically, to follow where the Spirit is leading. As we begin year 3 of this partnership in the mission field of Fort Scott, KS, as is always true, we have before us both challenges and opportunities. Laity Report - Jan Hedges. Highlights of the Great Plains Annual Conference. June 7-9, 2023



We were Introduced to the new Bishop

Bishop David Wilson is the first Native American in the world to serve as a bishop. Evidence of his faith and upbringing were shared through the opening worship and his message. He led the conference with compassion and humor.

During his message he stated: "My friends, in this room alone is a great wealth of talented and gifted people. However, there is also a wealth of talents and gifts that is going unused for the kingdom of God not just in this room but across the Great Plains Conference."

Clay in the hands of our creator - this year's theme

Throughout the conference a potter's wheel was at the front of the stage with Wanda Jackson of Centering Souls Retreat, Parksville, Missouri molding and shaping clay. Isaiah 64:8 – Yet, O Lord, you are our Father; we are the clay, and you are our potter; we are all the work of your hand.



The evening session, a service of commemoration and holy communion,

included an intentional time of lament. Recognizing the losses of Covid, disaffiliations and our personal losses. Recognizing a time of dissonance while realizing God's faithful presence in all circumstances. 156 churches disaffiliated this year, 10 churches closed, 750 UMC churches remain, and there are already 3 new launch churches. We lamented lost things, symbolically releasing pain, and demonstrating humility as one who desires to be molded by God by receiving a clay tile created by the potter. We were asked to write a word representing our lament on the back of the tile and to pray over our lament.

Lament tiles were then gathered on Thursday and the potter remade them into a UMC Cross and Flame sculpture which will hang in the conference office. As the

pieces symbolically expressed our lament, the remade pieces into the cross and flame represent our unity. As Rev. Adam Hamilton stated in his delegation report, "God has a way of working through division."

The conference was filled with hope, encouragement, and lots of reports. I was reminded of the interconnectedness of our denomination and the global reach of our ministry. We heard reports from camping, campus ministries, circuit clergy, disaster relief, diversity, equity, and inclusivity. Health, wellbeing of clergy and laity, UMM, UW in Faith, Global Ministries, Youth Leadership Lab and more...Reinforcing, we are stronger together than we are apart. Conference Lay Leader, Lisa Maupin, shared the vital role of laity. She compared it to planting a garden without seeing the results. Lisa reminded us of the Bishop's words, "Laity has great wealth, talents and



gifts of the spirit that are being <u>unused</u> for God's work. We need to change that." She asked, are you excited about serving God? God is calling us, you, me... Are we listening? Are we willing to deploy?

2050. Jeff Clinger, Congregational Excellence Director led a conversation about the church in 2050. It seems far away, 27 years to be exact. Twenty-seven years ago, it was 1996. Most of us remember 1996. The oldest church in the Great Plains Conference is 180 years old, the newest church today is 3 weeks old. He said, "To be clear, I have no crystal ball, but there are some things we can know. 2050 will be here before we know it, and the question for us is, are we just going to wake up in 2050 and go, 'Oh my gosh' here we are. We need to be intentional." In small groups we discussed: What is our hope for the church of 2050? How do we equip, connect and make disciples of Christ? How do we include all people, social justice, and community involvement? How do we ensure we have a church where everyone can be loved and be safe?


Youth Service

The youth service was dynamic, challenging and inspiring. 18-year-old Zander Seth, president of the Conference Council on Youth asked, "Are we ready for the next steps? The United Methodist Church, emphasis on United, needs to be a safe house of God for all the people of God. Be welcoming, inclusive and empowering of our youth now and into 2050."

Business

The business portion of the annual conference began with a special session May 31 (via zoom). During that session we addressed pre-conference business items, heard the proposed budget, and voted on disaffiliations and closures. Approved 655 / 29.





Business during the conference – June 7-9 included the following:

- Approved formation of a district boundaries committee
- Approved the budget
- Voted to **not** extend the time period for disaffiliation
- Approved resolution to support the creation of a regional conference which would encompass the United States as a separate entity.
- Approved a resolution to increase racial diversity on conference committees, cabinet, etc. equal to or above the minority percentage in the conference.
- Approved a "Building Bridges" resolution to pledge support and guidance for refugees entering the country.

Ordination service

A record number, 54 persons, were recognized for commissioning and ordination on Friday evening.

24 were ordained and 26 commissioned as provisional members including former First UMC intern Spenser Johnson!

Hope and encouragement: Throughout the conference I heard many quotes that were meaningful to me)

- No person should ever be invisible in our church.
- It is up to us to contribute to the lives of others.
- Every soul is a cherished soul.
- We meet God in our encounters with other people. Do they meet God when they encounter us?

It was my honor to represent Fort Scott United Methodist Church as your lay member to annual conference. I was a little overwhelmed and unsure what to expect. I left not only feeling hopeful for the future of our conference but also inspired.



Happy 320th Birthday, John Wesley (1703 – 1791)

Birthdays are good times for reflection. On June 28^{th,} 2023, we remembered John Wesley's 320th birthday. John Wesley is generally considered the founder of the Methodist movement, a branch of Protestant Christianity with expressions worldwide, including the United Methodist Church.

To support members of his church classes, Wesley developed the following 22 Questions for Self-Examination. How amazing that these questions are still relevant three centuries later, whether our work is global, local, or somewhere in between! If this list seems overwhelming, take the "22 in 22" challenge: try focusing on just one question per day for the next 22 days. Pause. Center-down. Reflect. And come away refreshed and inspired. John Wesley's 22 Questions of Self-Examination

- 1. Am I consciously or unconsciously creating the impression that I am better than I really am? In other words, am I a hypocrite?
- Am I honest in all my acts and words, or do I exaggerate?
- 3. Do I confidentially pass on to another what was told to me in confidence?
- 4. Can I be trusted?
- 5. Am I a slave to dress, friends, work, or habits?
- Am I self-conscious, self-pitying, or self-justifying?
- 7. Did the Bible live in me today?
- 8. Do I give it time to speak to me every day?
- 9. Am I enjoying prayer?
- 10. When did I last speak to someone else about my faith?
- 11. Do I pray about the money I spend?
- 12. Do I get to bed on time and get up on time?
- 13. Do I disobey God in anything?
- 14. Do I insist upon doing something about which my conscience is uneasy?
- 15. Am I defeated in any part of my life?
- 16. Am I jealous, impure, critical, irritable, touchy, or distrustful?
- 17. How do I spend my spare time?
- 18. Am I proud?
- 19. Do I thank God that I am not as other people, especially as the Pharisees who despised the publican?
- 20. Is there anyone whom I fear, dislike, disown, criticize, hold a resentment toward or disregard? If so, what am I doing about it?
- 21. Do I grumble or complain constantly?
- 22. Is Christ real to me?


