New Bishop Starts January 1, 2023

In the United Methodist Church, Bishops are selected from among the ordained Elders to be consecrated to a special role of leadership. They are the executive officers of each of our Conferences, which organize the connectional mission and ministry of United Methodist congregations in a geographic area.

We here at First UMC are part of the Great Plains Conference, which, in turn, is part of the South-Central Jurisdiction. This past week, 3 new Bishops were elected for our Jurisdiction and one of them, Rev. Dr. David Wilson, was appointed to be the new Bishop of the Great Plains, with our current Bishop, Rueben Saenze. being appointed to Central and North Texas.



A member of the Choctaw Nation of Oklahoma, Bishop Wilson is the first Native American ever elected Bishop in the UMC. He has served as a pastor and in a variety of conference roles for the Oklahoma Conference and Oklahoma Indian

Mission Conference. David is a 1990 graduate of Oklahoma City University, with a B.A. in Mass Communications. He received his Masters of Divinity from Phillips Theological Seminary in Tulsa, Oklahoma in 1994. He was the first clergy person from OIMC to graduate from Phillips Theological Seminary. He was named the Phillips Distinguished Alumni for 2007. He received honorary doctorates of Humane Letters from Bacone College in 2009 and in 2012, he received the Excellence in Teaching Award for Adjunct Faculty at OCU. We welcome Bishop Wilson!
