So, our next submission deadline is Thursday, August 22nd for the September newsletter. We'll be looking at



GOOD NEWS! HEALTHY CONGREGATIONS GRANT RENEWED!

Thanks in part to Peggy Stark and Suziee Barlett attending the Healthy Congregations retreat last spring as well the guiding work of our HOCROC committee and Shepherd's Center (now Aging Forward) steering team of Bonnie Milburn, Wilma Hibdon and Janet Braun we have again been awarded a \$1000 grant to "enhance the spiritual, physical, social, and emotional health of our congregation and community" during the 2024-2025

grant cycle. In past years, this grant has helped build the labyrinth at 3rd and Crawford as a place of prayer and meditation and launch our Aging Forward program to encourage fellowship and lifelong learning for retired adults. This Great Plains Conference program gives us resources to do the next thing! Our next full community needs assessment is due in June of 2026, so over the next two years we will be looking for additional ways we can make an impact and developing work plans for future grants. NEW SOUTHEAST KANSAS DISTRICT!



WOMEN'S READING GROUP RESUMES IN SEPTEMBER!



The Reading Group is a women's reading/discussion group that meets September through November. After the holidays, the group resumes in January through May. The objectives are to let women of the church become more acquainted with each other while stimulating their minds and learning some insights into reading literature. While not a bible study, many of the books address social or moral issues.

The Group meets on Wednesdays at 1:30 in the church library for about one hour. THE FIRST SESSION WILL BE SEPTEMBER 11, 2024. Dorothy Kivett is usually the moderator, but others in the group also moderate the discussions. Those attending are asked to provide their own copy of the book being discussed. On September 11, 2024, the group will discuss *Home Front* by Kristin Hannah. (We usually read about 100 pages each session.) The novel explores the difficulties of a woman helicopter pilot in a National Guard Unit who is called to duty in Iraq. The author addresses the emotions and mental stresses of separation from family, war, and a severe injury. Other books that will be used soon are *God of the Woods* by Liz Moore and *Sandwich* by Catherine Newman. TUESDAY MORNING SEWING GROUP AND 1ST THURSDAY STITCHERS ~ by Nancy Swanwick



Our stitching group began as a bi-monthly evening stitching group, as a Fiber Fellowship. We worked on our own projects and enjoyed each other's company. As we began to age out of careers, we started meeting on Tuesday mornings, but also gathering on the first Thursday of each month from 4-9 pm to make sure we could include those who still worked during the day. When we started our daytime sessions, we also decided to make small Quilts To Comfort once a month, somewhat in response to the Joplin tornado, but centered around

local people in need of comfort. For ten years, we produced and gave out personal sized quilts to the Red Cross, the Ronald McDonald House, the local first responders, nursing homes, local hospice, and one year every child in CASA was given a quilt. Covid paused our production, and when we finally felt comfortable meeting again, our mission changed back to fellowship after creating about 300 quilts for community members in need. We meet in the parlor on Tuesday mornings from 9-noon-ish, and in Fellowship Hall for First Thursday Stitchers nearly every month. Most of the Tuesday group bring hand work which includes patchwork, quilting, needlepoint, cross-stitch, knitting, embroidery, with lots of advice sought and given. Thursday nights often include sewing machines along with hand work, and also includes snacks to nourish our bodies. Occasionally we hold an all-day sew on Saturdays. Our groups are ecumenical and open to all. Occasionally there will be times when we do not meet, but the church office will be aware of this. We have formed great bonds between us and are always interested in seeing each other's projects. We appreciate having such a wonderful space in our church to meet and be creative.

The Beacon Food Drive 2024 is ON!

This year they are calling it "A-CAN-ABILITY"


A-CAN-ABILITY, this year's Beacon Food Challenge, will continue to compete based on total weight donated rather than counting item by item. Each week we will focus our contributions with only specific items

purchased, and the winner each week will be based on total package weight of target items donated. **This year's contest will run from Sunday, September 15th through Sunday, October 6th.** Celebration will occur on Sunday, October 13th, with a Potluck at First Presbyterian following worship. Non-winners will wash dishes following the celebration!!!!! Each church should prepare a skit to share!!!!

Count 1, Sunday, Sept. 15th - Peanut butter and Jelly (or similar) Count 2, Sunday, Sept. 22nd - Pasta and sauces, Mac n Cheese Count 3, Sunday, Sept. 29th - Boxed or bagged cereal, Powdered Milk Count 4, Sunday, Oct. 6th - Canned fruits, veggies, soups, Spam, tuna, salmon, stew, chili, etc. Weekly cash donations received on each Sunday will be counted as (1) pound per \$1.00.

RULES

- Each weekly "Sunday" count is due Monday by noon and reported to the other church's office.
- Weight used is from item packaging. Weekly winner is the church that brings the most weight of each item designated for that week.
- Items may be "saved up" to be counted during the assigned week if brought in early.
- Once that week's designated item passes, that item becomes "other items donated" and are ONLY counted in a tiebreaker.
- If weeks are split 2 to 2 on designated counts, "other items and cash donated" tiebreakers are used
- NOTE: churches may choose to use donated weekly cash to purchase items for a given week to try and win that week, BUT cash used cannot then also be counted for the tiebreaker later.
- The **OVERALL GOAL**, of course, is to continue the trend of each church donating more food (and cash) than last year so that **"The Beacon Wins"** through our **"A-CAN-ABILITY Food Drive."**


GOSPEL CONCERT SATURDAY OCTOBER 26TH

PASTOR'S UPCOMING CONTINUING EDUCATION AND VACATION DAYS PLANS

One of the requirements for clergy in the Great Plains Conference is continuing education. This life-long learning is twofold: spiritual formation and professional development. **Spiritual formation** is the intentional pursuit of the nourishment and renewal of one's relationship with Jesus Christ through the power of the Holy Spirit and the use of spiritual disciplines. **Professional development** is the intentional growth of professional identity, and the skills utilized in ministry that will enhance the effectiveness and excellence of the clergyperson. Over the next 18 months, I will be addressing both of these aspects through participation in Track 1 of the *Center for Pastoral Effectiveness of the Rockies* with an ecumenical group of fellow clergy.



This is a series of 6 in-person retreats and various other check-ins that will incorporate elements of both Spiritual Formation and Professional Development over 140 contact hours. My first retreat is **September 17-20**th in Denver and as long as air travel goes smoothly, I should be back before Sunday the 22nd. The rest of the retreat dates will be set once the group forms. These retreats are not vacation time, although I do expect them to be times of renewal (and I may, in the future, take a day or so in conjunction with them.)

Bishop Wilson has also called our annual Orders and Fellowship clergy gathering for **October 28th – 30th**, so I will be travelling to Kansas City for that.

I will take some more vacation days soon – once again attending soccer games in Kansas City – I'll see the KC Current NWSL team playing in an international cup with matches on Wednesday August 14th and Saturday, August 17th (but will be back for Sunday) and plan to attend the US Men's National Team vs Canada on Sept 7th. I am tentatively planning to take Sunday, Sept 8th off but details are pending.
