Another "necessary" thing is funding our mission and ministry – creating opportunities for people to encounter Christ and community more deeply. ## The Beacon Challenge is Underway!

After the first 3 weeks it is 2-1 Methodists. As this issue goes to press our challenge is Boxed Cereal and we'll know Monday if it's 3-1 or all tied up.



The final challenges are:

Sunday, October 8<sup>th</sup> – Soup & Canned Meats/Fish (chicken, Spam, tuna, salmon, stew, chili, etc).

Sunday, October 15<sup>th</sup> – *Peanut Butter and Jelly* (or similar).

And if needed the Tiebreaker "Other Items" TOTAL - also tallied by Monday, Oct 16<sup>th</sup> (includes all items not on list or brought after target date, by weight). Cash donations will be totaled here and count as One (1) pound per \$1.00

#### THE RULES:

•Each weekly "Sunday" count is due by Mondays at noon, reported to the other church's office. Weight used is from item packaging. Weekly winner is the church that brings the most (by weight) of each item by that item's Sunday (aka by the Monday noon deadline...)

- •Items may be "saved up" to be counted during the target week if brought early, but once that item's week passes, any further donations of said item just become "other items donated" and are included in the tiebreaker, but not retroactively to the item's weekly count.
- •Church that wins 4 of the 6 "weekly" count wins the trophy if we spilt 3-3 on designated counts, an "other items and cash donated" tiebreaker is used.
- •Churches may choose to use donated weekly cash to have someone purchase items for a given week to try and win that week BUT cash used that way cannot then also be counted for the tiebreaker later.
- •The overall goal, of course, is to continue the trend of each church donating more food (and cash) than last year so that "the Beacon wins!" Now... let's get that trophy back ©



#### SPEAKING OF CHALLENGES - EMAIL WOES



This one is considerably less fun. Email continues to be problematic, and Pastor Christopher has been working with tech support contacts from Microsoft (we use Outlook servers as part of our free Microsoft365 nonprofit license for Word, Excel, etc.) and Wix (our internet hosting site) to try and resolve numerous DNS problems. It has taken far, far more of his time than he'd like and is still not fixed. Right now, the primary issue is Google's gmail servers intermittently rejecting nearly anything we send out. It affects both our new domain and the old one. We consistently receive email sent to either set of addresses, but mail we send out repeatedly gets flagged and stopped. We hope to have this resolved soon.

One of the "new traditions" Pastor Christopher has introduced is passing out pinwheels at community parades as a form of engagement and outreach. #### **REAL CANDLES FOR CHRISTMAS EVE!**




We will again have real candles available for our annual "Silent Night" service at 7pm on December 24<sup>th</sup>.

Trustees has worked with our insurance company for a "once a year" exception to make this possible without raising our rates.

This year that date is also a Sunday, so we \*will\* meet at 10:30am for our normal worship service with an Advent theme and then at 7pm for our

traditional Christmas Eve with Communion.

This year our theme for Advent will be based on a book called "Advent in Plain Sight." In this daily devotional for Advent, Christmas, and Epiphany, Jill J. Duffield draws readers' attention to ten ordinary objects that appear in the biblical narratives of messianic prophesy and incarnation—objects we encounter in our own lives. Through objects such as gates, trees, cloth, light, and water, readers will find new meaning in the biblical account of Jesus' coming. By connecting everyday objects with biblical texts, Advent in Plain Sight prompts readers to see the near kingdom of heaven on earth and ponder what that divine proximity enables and asks them to do and be. Each daily devotional features a Scripture reading, prayer, and reflection, reminding Christians that God still

1<sup>st</sup> Week – October 18<sup>th</sup> - read pages 1-100, through chapter 3.


2<sup>nd</sup> Week – October 25th – read pages 101-223, through chapter 5.
